# The Middle Length Discourses of the Buddha

(The Majjhima Nikāya)

#### Fall 2016\*

The *Middle Length Discourses (Majjhima Nikāya)* is one of the most important anthologies of the teachings and religious practices attributed to the Buddha. Often presented in a narrative account including the circumstances and people that prompted the Buddha's teachings, these rich and dynamic discourses provide context for better understanding the content and nature of early Buddhist teachings. This online course consists of extensive reading of selected discourses (*suttas*) from the *Middle Length Discourses*. The readings will be organized around themes found in the collection including the nature of the Buddha and the path of practice he taught, karma, sensuality and renunciation, the practice of mindfulness and concentration, and Buddhist conceptions of wisdom and spiritual liberation.

#### **Course objectives:**

With the successful completion of this course, students should be able to:

- Critically and objectively evaluate texts from the early Buddhist tradition.
- Describe, explain and discuss teachings and practices presented in the *Middle Length Discourses* including teachings on the themes of the path of practice, the Buddha, meditation and Nibbāna.
- Describe, explain and discuss different rhetorical devices and narrative structures employed in the *Middle Length Discourses*.
- Analyze the relationship between different concepts, teachings and practices presented in the *Middle Length Discourses*.
- Communicate ideas in a clear, coherent and logical writing style.

## Course format, requirements and evaluation

## Reading

Each week there will be an Introductory Study Guide introducing the theme for that week. In addition, there will be study guides to support a reading of selected discourses from the *Middle Length Discourses* related to the week's theme. Please read the Introductory Study Guide first and the discourses and study guides in the order listed.

## Weekly forum postings

500-750-word posts discussing the theme for that week and/or the rhetorical strategies used in a discourse are due on the Thursday of each week. The "Questions to Consider" at the end of the Introductory Study Guide may serve as a prompt for the forum postings if desired. In addition, by Saturday of each week, please comment on at least one post from your fellow classmates in a thoughtful and respectful manner. Comments of at least six sentences are recommended. A student may miss one post and one comment during the semester without adversely affecting her grade. No post is required for reading week. Posts and comments are worth 30% of the final grade.

## Mid-term essay

This assignment does not require outside resources or research, but is an exercise in engaging with and analyzing the material in the *Middle Length Discourses*. The recommended topic for the essay will be provided during Week 5 although alternative topics will be considered. (Please email any proposals for alternatives to fronsdal.sati@gmail.com). The recommended length for the paper is 5 pages, double spaced. It is due Oct 31, 2016 and is worth 30% of the final grade. (Late papers not accepted).

## Final essay

This assignment requires careful analysis of a theme found in the *Middle Length Discourses*. The essay also requires research and references in at least two books or articles of modern scholarship on the early Buddhist discourses. A suggested topic for the essay will be provided during Week 11 although alternative topics will be considered. (Please email any proposals for alternatives to fronsdal.sati@gmail.com). The recommended length for the paper is 10 pages, double spaced. It is due Dec 16, 2016 and is worth 40% of the final grade. (Late papers not accepted).
